 Some Jews looked forward to the coming of the Messiah (and earthly ruler sent by God) because they wanted freedom from Roman rule. (p.)
3.) Jesus followed many teachings of Judaism, but he also taught ideas and practices that other Jewish leaders disagreed with. (p.468)
4.) When he was young, Jesus cured the sick and performed other miracles such as turning water to wine. Because of this, he began to gather followers. His closest followers were called disciples (p.468)

8.) After Jesus' death, Jews divided the world into Jews and Gentiles, or non-Jews. (p.478)
9.) Saul (Roman name Paul), first persecuted the early church, but converted after God revealed Jesus as His son to him.
He was the most successful and active in spreading the Christian faith. (p.478-479)
10.) The first members of Christian churches were the Jews. (p.)
11.) What was important about Saul that helped him convert nonbelievers to Christianity? (p.479) Cultural and political background
12.) Which three rulers helped Christianity spread throughout the Roman Empire? (p.) Constantine, Theodosius, Caesar
13.) Fear of the growing number of Christians led the Roman government to persecute the Christians. (p.484)

14.) Roman emperor, Constantine, ended the persecution of Christians after he saw a Christian cross in

the sky during a battle for leadership in Rome. (p.484)

15.) Theodosius was a Roman Emperor who closed all pagan temples. (p. 485)
